MAPLEDURWELL FARMING UPDATE

I write this on the first day of meteorological winter, December 1st. Following a wet and frustrating autumn most crops look ok. As the climate changes so the seasons are also changing. The dull cool summer has resulted in no beech masts and few acorns this autumn so the birds had a hungry gap, until the grapes in Surrey vineyards were ready. The grape harvest was late this year due to the weather.

On the farm we are starting the winter job of hedge cutting. I like to leave the hedges as long as possible before cutting, to allow wildlife time to eat any wild berries. This has to be balanced with public safety and the hedge cutting regulations. You would be surprised at how many rules apply to the simple job of cutting a hedge.

Another traditional winter job was winter ploughing. The aim was to plough all land destined for spring cropping before Christmas. The winter frosts then created a frost tilth in the soil perfect for spring sowing.

As the climate warms so the number and severity of frosts have declined. The change to wetter autumns mean the soil is waterlogged earlier and you can easily do more harm than good to soil structure by ploughing wet soil.

This year we have sown a cover crop on the land to be spring cropped. This cover crop will mop up any nutrients left in the ground from the previous harvest and help to dry the soil out ready for the spring.

As one year draws to a close so the next one begins. Both the farming cycle and natural cycle starts again, the annual reminder that as farmers we are only temporary custodians of the land we farm.

POLICE UPDATE

HANTS ALERT 20 NOVEMBER – Dogs and mobile phones seized by police responding to hare coursing

The afternoon of Tuesday 19 November, police received reports of two suspected hare coursing incidents in progress in the rural Basingstoke and Winchester areas. The first related to reports of a Mitsubishi Shogun

damaging fields in Laverstoke and Tufton. As police were responding to this, a report came in of second incident involving a Volkswagen Golf.

The police helicopter was deployed which located three men with dogs on farmland nr Bullington Cross. These individuals were seen to run into a wooded area before running through fields. Three men with dogs were later detained for a search by police. Two lurcher type dogs were seized and mobile phones were seized from the men.

HANTS ALERT 18 NOVEMBER – Police patrols in north Hampshire following hare coursing intelligence

The afternoon of Sunday 17 November police received intelligence around a potential large-scale hare coursing event expected to be carried out throughout the county. The northern Neighbourhood Enforcement Team (NET) based in Winchester were mobilised to conduct high visibility patrols around the county. During patrols, the NET officers engaged with local residents and also deployed the police drone to conduct a visual scan of rural areas from the air. Police in Hampshire also remained in close contact with our neighbouring officers over the border in Wiltshire, to share information and prepare for any calls from the public.

Inspector Cath MacDonald said:

'We recognise the level of concern rippling through rural communities at this time of year... 'Our plea is to keep reporting information to us. Any intelligence you may have, sightings of suspicious vehicles or people, or any crimes that have been affecting you. Please tell us everything so we can develop the bigger intelligence picture and take action.

'Last night's police activity is just one example of where we can mobilise the right units in the right areas quickly in direct response to what our intelligence picture is telling us. Other police units such as neighbourhood police teams and our specialist Country Watch team have conducted a number of proactive operations and patrols this season, which have seen suspected rural criminals disrupted and pursued out of the area. This will continue — and the more we know, the better placed we are to deal with these criminals effectively.'

I was a true believer in those days, my thoughts about Christmas were very much centred on one who was completely mysterious, utterly wonderful and totally giving.

This was the white bearded, red robed old gent who mysteriously and wonderfully drove his reindeer through the skies on Christmas Eve, managing to go down all the right chimneys to leave all the right gifts, and on that magical night the urgently repeated question was 'Has HE been?'. That thinking only filled my mind at Christmas though it made no difference to the rest of the year.

Then once I got into the business of nativity plays, Christmas thoughts began to be occupied with Mary, Joseph, an innkeeper, shepherds, angels and wise men – oh and a baby

although I was not too bothered about the baby – there was no chance you'd get to appear in the play as the baby! This story, delightful as it was, also made no difference to the rest of the year for it was as self-contained as my thinking about Father Christmas.

Then I found myself letting the baby in the manger grow up. I found myself being drawn to the man Jesus. This man was a pretty wonderful human being, he showed how life could be lived. Christmas was no longer self contained, it was a celebration of this particular life. I was beginning to discover Father Christmas was someone you grew out of; Jesus was someone you grew into, someone who showed us what our mysterious, utterly wonderful and totally giving God was about and just how far his love for us could go.

This was something which could be not contained, it was something which overflowed and spilled out into all the year because Jesus was for all day every day, HE has indeed come into the world – so that we can get in on the act – now that is exciting, pass the Calamine!

I wonder what experiences you have had of waiting for something for which you have longed? We tend not to have to wait for much in a world of fast-food, social media and binge-watching our favourite series on Netflix. But while waiting for something you really want can be hard, it can also be good for us; helping to exercise the muscles of patience and hope.

My wife, Mirjam, and I have just arrived in the UK from New Zealand and we are grateful to finally be joining the community and settling in to life here. But it's been a long wait. We started the process back in January and since then have had to wait for many things including a job, visa and a place to live. It has been hard at times but in the waiting we have found God's grace and provision.

You will need: 1 cup table salt 1 cup water 2 cups flour

Mix ingredients. On baking paper, roll dough into a long cylinder. Flatten and form into a spiral. Use a candle to make 25 evenly spaced depressions, one for each day (24 days in Advent this year, plus Christmas Day). The dough expands when baking so when pressing in your candle don't be afraid to make the depressions a

Bake at 180°F / Gas mark 4, until hardened (about 25-30 minutes).

You can choose to use just one candle which you move along one hole each day or you can use five; one to mark each of the four Sundays in Advent, and the fifth, usually called the Christ candle, for Christmas Day.

BDBC BUDGET CONSULTATION

FOR 2025/26 to Friday 03 January www.basingstoke.gov.uk/budget2025

Budget proposals include continuing the extra funding introduced last year: an additional £750,000 to keep streets and open spaces clean and well-maintained, and extra £180,000 to improve BDBC play areas.

New funding is proposed for an extreme sports event for summer; for re-opening public toilets at War Memorial Park, and for introducing free overnight parking 7pm-8am in borough council-owned car parks.


Additional funding also required for:

- ... roll-out of food waste collections; the work of the council's Green Team; more electric vehicle chargers; energy efficiency improvements for council-owned buildings; boosting the borough's biodiversity and maintaining the borough's trees;
- ... continuing to provide housing advice for residents; more one-to-one support for residents struggling with finances working with partners, this will form part of a wider action plan to tackle poverty in the borough.

An average 10p per week council tax increase is proposed, bringing the borough's part of the council tax to £146.42 a year for average household.
