From the Benefice Ministry Team

It is odd sitting here writing this on 6th December amid a house and shops full of

Christmas decorations and music, knowing that when you read this Christmas will have come and gone and we'll be into a New Year.

For me there is always a slight tinge of trepidation and sadness at this time of year, because both my maternal grandparents died in January, seven years apart, both unexpected. However, alongside this there is hope that each new year will be a blessed one.

Jesus, Emmanuel, Son of God, was born to bring hope to a world which in many ways was as troubled as our own. Brutal military forces occupying countries not their own; poverty; powerful and often corrupt rulers; failures of the system or those in authority within the religious community to uphold, protect and care for who were the most vulnerable; in those times often widows and children and in our times survivors of abuse.

The hope that Jesus brings shines a light both then and here and now. Hope that things can and will be better not just in some future second coming, but right now in this place and time.

Hope that conflicts will end; hope that climate change can be tackled and halted; hope that we can share our wealth more evenly with those who have so little; hope for education and an end to practices which degrade girls and women; hope that we can be more loving as a world.

Hope for institutions- whether they

be the church, broadcasting or education; NHS or police to act swiftly upon racist, misogynistic, negligent or abusive practices; to challenge inequality and injustice boldly, with compassion. Hope for our communities to be better, safer more honest places.

In Newnham this coming year we are going to have some conversations around Hope, Peace and Purpose. The first one will be about this very subject: Hope.

Hope starts with the light of Christ which already resides in each one of us. Although we can't change the world single-handedly in one go, we can each take a 'small bite' out of it.

My husband is involved in a charity called Community Food Link (CFL) in Basingstoke, which was started by two ladies in 2020 who wanted to do something about food waste from supermarkets. In only four years it has 80 volunteers, two vans, collects five tonnes of food per week that would go to waste and feeds 3,000 people per week on a 'turn up' basis.

They didn't start out to do such a big thing, just something little they could do, but CFL brings a huge amount of hope to people who are struggling financially.

What will be your something little that you can do in 2025 to bring a bit of hope to this world? Or to your community?

As well as a happy New Year I wish you a hope-full 2025.

NEW NPPF (NATIONAL PLANNING POLICY FRAMEWORK) AND INCREASED HOUSING ALLOCATIONS

BDBC update from Cllr Andy Konieczko, Cabinet Member for Strategic Planning & Infrastructure, emailed to all Parishes on 13 December

'Government has imposed a higher housing number on our borough as part of its changes to the national planning rules. We've been told that we must build 1,127 new houses each year during our next Local Plan period, up from 828 previously. This means finding space for around 4,500 more properties – on top of the 12,500 or so that we were already being asked to build over the 15-year lifespan of the next Local Plan.

'While we support Government's ambition to make homes more affordable, we don't agree that forcing councils to increase housing targets will achieve this aim. We've robustly told Government this on many recent occasions – through our official response to its consultation on the new planning rules; at meetings with the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government; in discussions with our MPs; and through our partnerships with other councils – and are frustrated that it hasn't listened.

'We're unable to proceed with finalising the draft Local Plan we've been developing over the past 18 months and which went out to public consultation earlier this year. We've made it clear to the government that we wanted to finalise it as soon as possible so that our borough is protected from unwanted speculative development. It now appears that we'll have to go back a few stages to make sure that our Plan complies with the new rules.

'We'll continue to study the detail of all of the documentation over the next few days... to understand exactly what our options are...'

THE WAY FORWARD AND A NEW CALL FOR SITES

Further email update of 20 December...

'We don't believe that this new higher target is right for our borough, but it looks like we have little choice but to accept it; the Government has made it clear that it'll step in if progress isn't made.

'Our focus is therefore on moving as quickly as we can – the sooner we get a new Local Plan, the sooner we'll get protection from speculative developers.

'We'll be working over the new couple of weeks to prepare a call for sites that we'll launch on Monday 6 January. This will ask developers and landowners to come forward with land that could, potentially, be included in the Plan for future development. Submissions involving brownfield land will be particularly encouraged. The submissions that we receive will then be assessed in terms of whether they are suitable for future development.

'Over the coming weeks, we'll clarify how we aim to progress with our Local Plan and start setting out a timeline to move forward under the new NPPF.'

HAMPSHIRE POLICE RURAL TIMES MAGAZINE

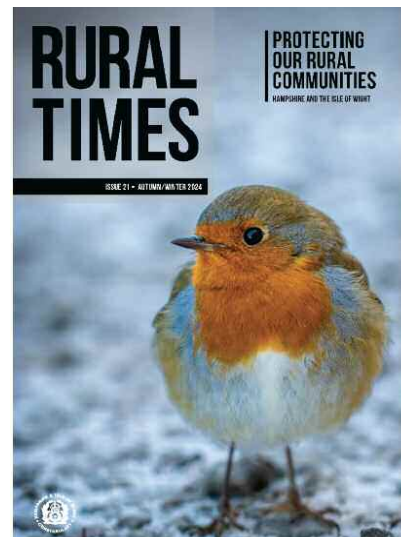
Autumn/Winter 2024

ABOUT THE EVENT As the UK's climate changes, more frequent periods of intense rainfall will affect how water moves through the landscape. With localised flooding becoming more likely, there are implications for both people and wildlife. This is especially true here in Hampshire, where our underground chalk aquifer also causes water to rise up from below.

In this talk, Sue Illman from Illman Young Landscape Design will explore how Sustainable Drainage Systems (SuDS) can help us to tackle this issue. Using natural processes as their model, these systems help to move, collect, or attenuate stormwater, while also providing biodiversity benefits.

This talk is the first in a two-part series that will cover:

Part 1: How SuDS work, why we need them, & where they can be useful.

Part 2: How communities can add SuDS to their houses and roads.

Sue is a practicing landscape architect and a specialist in historic landscape conservation, with a long-term interest and expertise in hard landscape construction and planting design. She has extensive experience in both lecturing on, and delivering training about, SuDS and frequently acts as Project Manager for landscape-led projects. She was also among the authors of CIRIA's SuDS manual.

This event is part of 'Watercress and Winterbournes', a Landscape Partnership Scheme that is protecting, enhancing, and celebrating seven local chalk streams. winterbournes@hiwwt.org.uk

NPPF – IMMEDIATE EFFECT AND LAND SUPPLY

MHCLG's new National Planning Policy Framework of Dec 2024 has immediate effect with regard to day-to-day planning (development management) decisions, including policies on land supply.

Land supply – As per NPPF Para 78 'Maintaining supply and delivery', the required land supply is again five years with a 5% buffer, and a 20% buffer (ie six years) where there has been significant under-delivery of housing over the previous three years. (BDBC's Authority Monitoring Report (AMR) of Dec 2024 showed a land supply of 4.2 years against the 01 April 2024 Standard Method figure of 828 dwellings per annum.)

But also, as from 1 July 2026, a 20% buffer – six years' land supply – is needed where a Local Plan housing requirement was adopted in the last five years and examined against a previous version of the NPPF.

Thus there is no 'win' with regards to land supply under any BDBC Local Plan Update scenario that is or may potentially have been available.

The only means for BDBC to again achieve its required land supply is to have a new Local Plan adopted under the new NPPF and housing numbers. Draft Plans currently in preparation have until December 2026 to submit; BDBC is making it clear it will proceed as speedily as possible.
